New definition of SMEplus

In the wake of the subprime bubble, the banking crisis and a global economic downturn we quite often hear the term "real economy". It simply stands for family businesses where a natural person bears all the responsibility for the wellbeing of the company and its employees, driven by a medium to long term thinking over generations.

If more than 90 percent of SMEs under the new definition of the Commission are micro firms – we need a new or additional definition of the very large SMEs, which are so typical for the marine equipment manufacturing industry!





Class Directive / Class Regulation

Three years after the 3rd Maritime Package was launched by the Commission, the eight measures proposed were adopted in March 2009. This is an important step towards restoring the competitiveness of the sector while benefiting only those operators who respect safety standards, in particular by increasing pressure on owners of sub-standard ships.

The Commission will be helped by the European Maritime Safety Agency (EMSA) for the implementation of the package.

The major changes/improvements are:

- ▶ Article 20 of the Class Regulation requests recognized organisations to consult with each other in order to improve the level of harmonization of technical standards and regulations, and requests recognized organisations to agree on the conditions under which they will mutually recognize their respective certificates based on equal standards. The Regulation entered into force 20 days after its publication in the Official Journal. In other words: Mutual recognition of certificates.
- ▶ A specialised body will be set up in order to audit and certify the quality management system of EU-recognised organisations, to which Member States use to delegate the inspection and statutory certification of their ships.
- ▶ In addition, the recognition criteria will be made stricter and a system of financial penalties for those organisations that do not do their job properly will be established.
- ▶ If the shortcomings of a recognised organisation are such that safety is no longer guaranteed, their license will be withdrawn.







Intellectual Property

The "Shipbuilding IPR Study" of Houthoff Buruma – submitted to the Commision in 2007 – clearly stated

"Shipyards are the key organisers and the equipment industry is the producer of innovative parts and complex integrated systems" and they continued


"A significant part of the innovation in the shipbuilding industry is not protected".

While shipbuilders go primarily for a protection of a design, the equipment industry is much more depending on patents. But there is no efficient IPR protection and enforcement in the European Union and the global leadership of the innovative European marine equipment industry comes under pressure.

The consequence out of that – boosted by a worsening global economy – will be a tsunami of substandard, counterfeited and pirated marine equipment pooring into Europe. Until now, this type of equipment is deployed in the hulls forming an integral part of new built ships.

It will be the industry's urgent task to introduce efficient methods and systems for the protection of it's know how.

One very promising possibility is - Authentication.



Remark: A Free Trade Agreement (FTA) with Korea – which at the moment is quite likely to be signed – will have serious consequences on the protection and enforcement of the industry's IP rights!



Authentication

The mature, marine equipment manufacturing industry will have to protect its intellectual property and its competitiveness much more efficiently by bringing into use methods of

- authentication of products (original vs fake)
- methods of tracing and tracking both in the supply chain and over the entire lifecycle

The technologies, methods and tools are available not only to properly authenticate components made from steel and other metals, but also plastic or even textiles.










Established and potential Austrian Suppliers








